

Double success in Shop Local challenge

THE Local's Shop Local campaign has scored a double success this week.

County councillor Sue Woolley has been searching for a variety of items suggested by readers to demonstrate that, with a little imagination, almost anything can be bought in Bourne.

This week she found a paint-pen used for touching up cars and even found a music teacher able to supply guitar strings to budding musicians.

Sue found two garages able to supply the touch-up pens - Hall's Garage in Morton, and Woolf's Garage on Harrington Street in Bourne.

Sue said: "It was difficult to find this one. They can be delivered on the same day if ordered early enough or the next day."

Halls bodyshop technician Adam Key said: "All vehicles

have colour codes and we can match most cars with these or get the colours made up."

Sue added: "Anita Woolf said they would be more than happy to order any colour required."

She was more fortunate in her hunt for guitar strings, bumping into guitarist and music teacher Ken Wainwright at the mayor of Bourne's recent Civic Ball.

Ken, of Mill Drove who teaches music at the Robert Manning College, said: "I met her at the Civic Ball and she asked me if I knew anybody who could supply her with guitar strings and I said I would be delighted.

"I keep a stock of all sorts of guitar strings for students. I am not a retailer but any students who need guitar string can leave a message with the college."

Ken will only recoup any costs for strings and added: "My original box of strings came from Richardsons and I have kept it stocked ever since."
